HISTORY WHERE WE'VE BEEN

2009 : Tribal Tourism Working Group Concludes – Oregon Guide to Indian Country remained in publication until 2013

2019 / 2020: Travel Oregon's Marketing and Partnerships team meets with the 9 Tribes of Oregon to redevelop working relationship and to vet ideas for "Origins" campaign.

2020: Covid-19 has major impacts on Oregon's Tourism Industry. Global Marketing and Partnerships resume working on relationship development via online channels such as Basecamp and e-mail.

TRIBAL TOURISM COLLABORATION GOALS & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Hired Michelle Liberty, Attitude Marketing, Tribal Tourism Contractor
- Presented Travel Oregon's Tribal tourism strategy to the LCIS.
- Continue to meet with all relevant parties from each Tribe including government officials, tribal member entrepreneurs, and executives of tribally owned business.
- Create and maintain a working relationship with all Tribes and Tribal enterprises.
- Connect RDMOs to Oregon's nine tribes
- Convened / reestablished a Tribal tourism working group
- Convene all federally recognized Tribes of Oregon at Travel Oregon's Governors Conference March 2022 to share accomplishments, challenges and projected next steps.
