





TRIBAL TOURISM AND TRAVEL OREGON OUR HISTORY

Travel Oregon and the nine federally recognized tribes first collaborated back in 2006 when they met to explore mutually beneficial opportunities which resulted in the production of a Travel Guide to Indian Country. The group lost its momentum shortly thereafter and disbanded but the guide was a success and the concept of an ongoing partnership continued to tempt all involved. Then, in 2019, Travel Oregon took the initiative to invite the tribes to once again look at how they could collaborate. The idea was well received by all the tribes which resulted in a now very active committee with strong Travel Oregon support.

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

Tribal Tourism Leadership Committee

- Our Tribal Tourism Liaison, Michelle Liberty, enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Umatilla, works directly with tribal representatives to facilitate group communications and activities and advise on tribal protocols and processes.
- A committee with designated representatives from each tribe and staff from Travel Oregon meet via Zoom monthly to share information, collaborate on projects and strengthen industry relations.
- The committee meets twice annually in person to define its strategic priorities.
- Committee representatives advise on culturally appropriate actions and terminology and share how as partners we can encourage responsible, culturally respectful tourism development



WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

Travel Oregon and seven of the nine tribes recently signed a **historic MOU** designed to:

- Acknowledge tribal sovereignty and the right to self-determination.
- Formalize collaboration to promote tribal tourism.
- Create a structure for ongoing communication and partnership.
- Ensure tribal voices are included in statewide tourism planning and strategy.
- The final two MOUs are in process.



WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

Partnerships

Travel Guide to Oregon Indian Country: Co-produced by Travel Oregon and all nine tribes, this guide includes tribal history, locations, businesses, events, and visitor tips.

Five of Oregon's Nine Tribes participated in a KATU AMNW segment sharing how their tribe is an important economic driver and partner in their communities.

Attend AIANTA (American Indian Alaska Native Tourism Association) annual conference. Michelle Liberty represents the Northwest Region on the AIANTA Board.

Attend / Collaborate at Oregon Governor's Conference on Tourism

Collaboration with the Legislative Commission on Indian Services & Governor Kotek's Tribal Liaison.
