PROGRAM INTENT

TRAVEL OREGON'S MISSION AND PRIORITIES

The mission of the Oregon Tourism Commission (Travel Oregon) is to inspire travel that uplifts Oregon communities. Collaborating with partners to align as stewards of Oregon, we work to optimize economic opportunity, advance equity and respect the ecosystems, cultures and places that make Oregon...Oregon.

Travel Oregon's [10-Year Strategic Vision](#) holds four objectives:

- Oregon's tourism **economy** is flourishing
- Oregon is striving to be a place of **equity**
- Oregon delivers remarkable **experiences**
- Oregon respects its natural **environments**

To support the development and improvement of local economies and communities throughout Oregon, 10% of Travel Oregon's budget is dedicated to a Competitive Grants Program for the means of enhancement, expansion and promotion of the visitor industry.

Each of the interconnected objectives are supported by strategies to help bring Travel Oregon's mission to life. The 2026 Competitive Grants Program is designed to align with the objectives above. While it falls under the "Required to Operate" section of [Travel Oregon's 2025-2027 Biennial Plan](#), it has been developed to align most closely with the following Key Performance Indicators:

- Measure and monitor visitor spending & tourism employment
- Measure and monitor visitor & resident sentiment

The 2026 Competitive Grant Program will focus funding on projects that extend the visitor season, increasing spending and opportunities for year-round employment.

GRANT PURPOSE

Grant funds are intended to support projects that align with Travel Oregon's vision: Oregon is a welcoming destination where tourism drives economic prosperity, benefits the natural environment and celebrates rich, diverse cultures. Fluctuations in the seasonality of visitation offer key points in time when strategic investments can positively impact visitor spending. By emphasizing a destination stewardship approach, funds can benefit the economy while reducing environmental impact and balancing visitor experience with resident sentiment.

The 2026 Competitive Grants Program will focus funding on projects that extend the visitor season, increasing visitor spending and opportunities for year-round employment. These projects must be completed and show impact between September 23, 2026 and September 23, 2028 to be considered for funding. The Oregon Tourism Commission is mandated to fund programs and base grant awards on demonstrated return on investment, geographic equity and community support.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY

Eligible applicants include those listed below that are *doing business* in Oregon and can demonstrate direct work in support of improving the economic impacts of Oregon's travel and tourism industry:

- Local governments (city or county, not state or federal agencies)
- Port districts
- Federally recognized tribes
- Non-profit entities registered with the Oregon Secretary of State's Office

Ineligible applicants include those listed below:

- For-profit entities
- Entities that have a bankruptcy or other financial corruption within the past five years
- Entities that have failed to fulfill past grant award requirements within the past three years, including project completion, completion of required grant reporting, and proper use of grant funds

Only one proposal may be submitted per entity, and only one proposal may be submitted per project (multiple entities may not request funding for the same project).

PROJECT PREFERENCES

Applicants must propose a project that extends the visitor season, increasing visitor spending and opportunities for year-round employment through either tourism infrastructure or tourism promotion.

Though not a comprehensive list of preferred project types, those below are strongly aligned with this grant program.

- 1) *Outdoor Recreation*
 - Trail conversion/upgrades to increase off-season use
 - Increasing access to wildlife and recreation in coordination with efforts to steward the environment
- 2) *Sports Tourism*
 - Securing competitive sporting events that attract overnight visitors
 - Facility upgrades to increase visitation such as HVAC or winterization
- 3) *Arts, Culture and Events*
 - Partnership packages of multi-day events designed to increase overnight stays, such as entertainment + lodging or culinary celebrations
 - Securing business conferences or major national/international events that attract overnight visitors
 - Facility upgrades to increase visitation such as HVAC or winterization
- 4) *Transportation*
 - Solutions to deliver new or additional visitors to destinations
- 5) *Marketing/Promotion*
 - New or expanded campaign that strengthens the destination's presence in key markets
 - Branding effort to bring partners together around a shared message or product offering

PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES NOT FUNDED

The following activities are not eligible for grants in this program:

- Mobile app development
- Deferred, regular or ongoing maintenance and upkeep
- Cannabis or tobacco tourism-related projects
- Expenses incurred prior to September 23, 2026

AWARD AMOUNTS

AVAILABLE FUNDING

Total funding available for the 2026 Competitive Grants program is \$5 million. The minimum award for this application cycle is \$500,000. Only projects with expenses totaling \$1 million or greater will be considered for funding. Successful letters of intent (LOI) will be invited to submit a full application that includes a funding request amount determined by the Oregon Tourism Commission through a public review process.

HOW TO APPLY

Step 1: Submit a letter of intent form between 8 a.m. PT on April 7, 2026 and 5 p.m. PT on April 27, 2026 via the online system.

Step 2: Staff will review your letter of intent and confirm your eligibility.

Step 3: The Oregon Tourism Commission will review eligible letters of intent and may suggest revisions to strengthen your project concept. Request amounts will be determined at this time by the Oregon Tourism Commission.

Step 4: If invited to submit a full application, use the email notification to access and complete the online application by 5 p.m. PT on July 1, 2026. No applications or materials will be accepted after this deadline.

Before beginning the online process, we encourage applicants to gather all information and documents listed in the Letter of Intent and Application sections below.

LETTER OF INTENT

All potential applicants need to submit a letter of intent form by the 5 p.m. PT deadline on April 27, 2026 to be considered for funding. The LOI questions are on pages 12 and 13 of this document.

APPLICATION

Once the letter of intent is approved, the applicant will receive an email providing access to the online application. *Applications that vary substantially from the approved letter of intent will be ineligible to receive funding.* Deadline to complete the online application is 5 p.m. PT on July 1, 2026. The application questions are on pages 12 and 13 of this document.

The following uploads are required as part of the application:

- ✓ [Travel Oregon Substitute Federal W-9 Form](#) – form must be complete, signed and dated
- ✓ [Project Budget Form](#) (must use the form provided)
 - No more than 10% of the request amount may pay for administrative/non-project costs
 - Applicants with annual operating expenses under \$1,000,000 per year and tribal entities may include up to 15% administrative/non-project costs
- ✓ Project Specific Uploads
 - *Construction Permitting*: Evidence of approval from permitting authorities for tourism infrastructure development/construction (if required locally)
 - *Signage Approval*: evidence of approval to place signage (if signage is included in project scope)
 - *Distribution Plan*: A distribution plan and associated budget costs (if producing collateral is included in project scope)
- ✓ Letters of Support: between 3 and 5 project endorsements from external partners that speak to the potential impact of the extended visitor season

MATCHING FUNDS

Due to the high dollar value of awards in this cycle, 1:1 matching funds are required. This means that for every dollar an applicant requests in a grant award, they must contribute a dollar, either from their own budget or an external source.

For applicants with annual operating expenses under \$1,000,000 per year and Tribal entities, in-kind resources may be used to reach up to 50% of the required matching funds.

ONLINE APPLICATION SYSTEM

Access the letter of intent form between April 7, 2026 and April 28, 2026 via [Travel Oregon's online grant system](#).

Applicants who have previously applied for a Travel Oregon Competitive Grant or an Oregon Wine Country License Plates Matching Grant may use their existing password to log in. Once logged into your applicant dashboard, you can access the letter of intent by selecting "Apply" in the top navigation. All other applicants will need to select "Create New Account" to begin.

Upon approval of the letter of intent, Travel Oregon will email applicants with an invitation to complete the online application. The application will be accessed through the same online application system using the link above.

When applicants log back into their account after receiving the invitation email, the application will be assigned in the "Active Requests" tab. On the right-hand side, in blue, click "Edit Application." NOTE: Clicking on "Apply" at this point will open a new LOI form, not the application.

All submissions must be completed and submitted online by the posted deadline. All submissions are final. Be sure to check all work prior to submission.

DEVELOPING A STRONG PROPOSAL

REVIEW PROCESS

Proposals are reviewed by different audiences to provide multiple points of view and opportunities for success.

Eligible letters of intent will be reviewed by a group of staff members from Travel Oregon using the Review Criteria rubric in these guidelines. The results of that scoring will be presented to the Oregon Tourism Commission, who will determine which proposals to invite forward to submit a full application and at what grant request amount.

Complete applications will be shared with Oregon Tourism Commissioners who will score each application using the full Review Criteria rubric in these guidelines. Reviewers will be able to reference the letter of intent in addition to all application materials. These scores will provide information to help the Oregon Tourism Commission determine the most strategic investment of grant funds in this cycle.

All applicants should be prepared to record a 5-7 minute presentation on the overview and potential impact of their project to be shown, and made available to the public, at the September, 23, 2026 Oregon Tourism Commission meeting. Details will be provided at the time of invitation to apply.

GRANT REQUIREMENTS (IF AWARDED FUNDS)

Applicants who are awarded a grant will enter into a contractual relationship with Travel Oregon that includes agreements to comply with all guideline requirements and to complete the project as approved. Signed contracts should be returned within thirty days.

FUNDING USE, BUDGET AND SPENDING TIMELINE

Projects will be monitored by Travel Oregon. Grant recipients are required to maintain accurate records of how dollars are spent and must agree to provide Travel Oregon with access to these records in a timely manner, when requested. Grant recipients will be required to keep an ongoing, updated timeline and budget throughout the lifetime of the grant. Grant recipients are required to spend awarded funds by September 23, 2028. Any unspent funds must be returned to Travel Oregon.

The grant project budget must be submitted using the Excel template provided by Travel Oregon. A final budget, including proof of spending for expenses incurred, will be required to be uploaded in the Grant Accomplishment Report. Grant recipients are strongly encouraged to use the “Receipt Tracker” tool provided in the Excel template to track which budget line items proof of spending is tied to, but applicants may provide the information in another format if that is more efficient.

TRAVEL OREGON RECOGNITION

In many areas of Oregon, a regional style guide has been developed for use by tourism businesses and destination marketers. Grant recipients are encouraged to adopt these guidelines to better align with other communication efforts. Travel Oregon may be available to consult on specific design needs.

Grant recipients shall visibly display Travel Oregon’s logo on all finished grant projects (publications, websites and other significantly visible project activities) along with the acknowledgement: “This project has been funded in part by a grant from Travel Oregon.” Travel Oregon will work with grant recipients to ensure proper usage and placement of the Travel Oregon logo.

Do not place Travel Oregon recognition on wayfinding signage, unless authorized by Travel Oregon to do so. Grant recipients must submit signage designs to Travel Oregon for review prior to production and placement.

When designing signage, collateral or marketing materials associated with a grant-funded project, grant recipients shall allow at least two weeks for Travel Oregon to review the project design and provide feedback (timing will depend on the complexity of the project). Grant recipients must cease further grant project design work until feedback from Travel Oregon has been delivered. While grant recipients are not required to make all recommended changes Travel Oregon may provide, grant recipients must adhere to all grant program requirements. Recognition requirements will be included in grant recipients’ contracts.

GRANT REPORTS

Required reports will be submitted through Travel Oregon’s online grant management system.

Mid-Project Report

Grant recipients are required to provide an update on the status of their project and submit a current project budget to Travel Oregon 11 months after award notification. The Mid-Project Report is due August 31, 2027.

Accomplishment Report and Final Budget

Recipients are required to complete a final Accomplishment Report. The final project budget along with proof of spending must be uploaded as part of the report. The Accomplishment Report is due by October 23, 2028. Recipients will be asked to share project accomplishments in a presentation to the Oregon Tourism Commission in December, 2028.

You may submit reports earlier than required dates if your project timeline allows. Failure to submit reports by their deadline may result in ineligibility for any future grant programs offered by Travel Oregon.

GRANT FUNDS DISBURSEMENT

Following approval and execution of contract, an initial disbursement of up to 50% of the grant award will be sent to recipients upon request. Recipients are eligible to receive up to 90% of the remaining awarded funds through a reimbursement system with documentation of expenses. Final disbursement of funds will be sent once the project is complete, the Accomplishment Report has been submitted and the final budget and proof of spending documentation has been reviewed and approved by Travel Oregon.

Any grant funds not used as approved shall be returned to Travel Oregon pursuant to the grant contract. Grant funds may only be used for costs related to the project and clearly identified in the grant budget. Projects must be completed within the approved project timeline.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

DEFINITIONS

Visitor

Travel Oregon defines a visitor as a person traveling more than 50 miles to reach a destination or a person utilizing an overnight stay at a destination. While successful projects should take into account the needs and capacity of immediate community members, proposals for this grant program must have a primary focus on enhancing, expanding or promoting visitor experiences.

Annual Operating Expenses

Nonprofits should use the figure on line 18 of their most recently filed 990. Other entities should total the day-to-day costs required to maintain normal operations. The figure should not include capital expenditures, depreciation or debt.

In-kind Donations

An in-kind donation is a nonfinancial contribution from an external party of goods or services. They may also include gifts of land or buildings, use of facilities, advertising time or works of art.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Responses to programmatic questions submitted in writing will be posted on the Competitive Grants Program Frequently Asked Questions page (URL to be added when page is active).

AI USE

Travel Oregon does not use AI to screen or evaluate applications received. If applicants choose to utilize AI in developing their applications, human review is strongly encouraged to confirm all criteria are addressed, questions are answered thoroughly, the overall presentation of the project makes sense and that the project deliverables are achievable by your organization if awarded funds. Clear proposals with specific information about your request will be the most successful.

PREPARING TO APPLY

In addition to the program-specific questions and information below, applicants will be expected to provide general information in their account set-up such as organization name, federal tax identification number, mailing address, project contact person, etc. We encourage you to gather this information ahead of time as well as consider potential responses to the questions below as you develop your project.

NON-NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

The following information will be required in the Letter of Intent.

- End date of most recently completed fiscal year
- Applicant total operating expenses for most recently completed fiscal year
- Estimated total project expenses
- Estimated in-kind income for project
- Estimated Secured Income to date (progress towards achieving required match)
- Estimated Pending project income to date (requests submitted/under review by funder)
- Estimated Planned project income to date (upcoming requests)
